He has also authored the memoirs For All of Us, One Today: An Inaugural Poet's Journey and The Prince of Los Cocuyos: A Miami Childhood, winner of a Lambda Literary Award. His latest book, Boundaries, challenges the physical and psychological dividing lines that shadow the United States. A new book of poems, How to Love a Country, is from Beacon Press in April 2019. He has taught at Georgetown University, American University, and Wesleyan University. He serves as the first Education Ambassador for The Academy of American Poets.
